Early bird tickets for Adelaide Memory Walk & Jog on sale now

Early bird tickets are now on sale for the Adelaide Memory Walk & Jog. Organisers are encouraging participants to register before midnight on Monday 21 January 2019, to save up to 20 per cent per ticket.

The event will take place on Sunday 17 March 2019, at the Colley Reserve, Colley Terrace, Glenelg, SA.

Memory Walk & Jog raises much-needed funds to support the work of Dementia Australia, which provides invaluable support, education and resources for people living with dementia in Australia, their carers, families and friends.

Last year more than 1,000 people took part from across Adelaide. This year, participants can choose to take part in a 3km, 6km or 10km walk, jog or run, and are invited to help us reach the \$110,000 fundraising target. All funds raised will benefit Dementia Australia services in South Australia.

Dementia Australia CEO Maree McCabe said the course is family-friendly, and suitable for all ages and fitness levels.

"We're excited to be returning to Adelaide in 2019 and to be working with Australians to get active and beat dementia, whilst raising much-needed funds and awareness," Ms McCabe said.

There will be prizes for the top fundraisers, as well as raffles, plenty of entertainment for the whole family, food stalls, a jumping castle and a special guest appearance from Memory Walk & Jog mascot, AI the Elephant.
